However, a new native plant, Tapegrass or Eel grass, first seen in 2010, has taken over in some areas of the pond. The reasons for this aren't fully understood yet, but planning has begun to understand how to control it.

18th Annual Dudley Pond Run/Walk and Kids Fun Run

On Sunday, September 21, the weather forecast was for steady showers throughout the day. It looked like the Annual Dudley Pond Run/Walk and Kids Fun Run would be held in the rain for the first time in 18 years. The Dudley Pond Association works closely with Wayland's Surface Water Quality Committee to monitor the health of Dudley Pond... a "great pond" of Massachusetts. The Annual Run/Walk and Kids Race benefits the Dudley Pond Association's work to preserve the health of this important natural resource and its watershed.

Sylvia Greene, personal trainer at <u>Passion to Move</u>, began the day with a non-competitive fitness walk along the Dudley Pond shoreline. Then kid's races began for ages 1-13. Each race ended with ribbons for all and Dilly Ice Cream Bars donated by Dairy Queen of Natick.

The challenging 5K USATF sanctioned run and 2 Mile competitive walk followed a hilly course along the Dudley Pond shoreline with a loop back to the finish. Runners and walkers in the 5K and 2M walk ranged in ages from 7 to 80+. Teams of runners and walkers participated from the event's Official Sponsor, Get in Shape for Women-Wayland, from the Greater Framingham Running Club, Fitness Together-Wayland, and the Village Bank. Following the race, raffle prizes were given out and trophies were awarded to Overall and Division winners.

Surface Water Quality Committee: 2014 Season-End Update

The Strange Case of the Missing Milfoil

From the full-court press of 2013 – a 12 acre herbicide spot treatment, and pulling a record 44,699 plants – to 2014 when the Eurasian Milfoil plants were few and far between...

Yes, it's still popping up, and yes we are still hand-pulling it – but what happened? Is it gone for good? Don't count on it.

We gave it a solid whack with both hand-pulling and spot herbicide last year. The spot treatment was later in the year – perhaps so late that regrowth was limited. We had a long winter – and a record late ice-out – meaning not much light was getting through. Then came the algae – cloudy water, and floating algal mats that we removed. The algae reduced the light and coated the plants.

Tapegrass

Milfoil's competition has arrived in force: Vallisneria Americana, aka tapegrass, or eel grass.



Tapegrass has taken over beds where milfoil used to predominate.

First spotted in 2010 South of the peninsula in the Chateau arm, it has spread there and now forms thick mats making boating and swimming problematic.

It can spread by seeds but mostly through its rhizomes – runners in the sediments.

It has spread to nearly all of the shoreline.

Can we do anything about it? We are removing floating mats, but it's not in our "Order of Conditions" from the Conservation Commission – so we are limited in 2014.

Unlike Eurasian Milfoil, tapegrass is a native plant and brings some benefits to the ecosystem. But even natives can become nuisance weeds – the DEP now recognizes this.

It has become so troublesome that we've mapped it so we would have data to bring to Conservation.

Over the winter divers Ted Fiust, Allison LaClaire will confer with the SWQC. We'll do our research and may submit a Notice of Intent to Conservation for permission to manage it.

Septic Management & Stormwater

SWQC has researched septic practices around Dudley Pond and near water bodies in other Massachusetts towns – and plans to make recommendations to the Board of Health to minimize nutrient contributions to Dudley Pond.

In collaboration with the DPW, parts of the stormwater handling system (along Simpson Road) has been cleaned with the town's 'vac truck' and mapped. SWQC will work with DPW, Recreation, and Conservation to improve stormwater handling in the Mansion Beach area.
